




Map to Bob & Patty Ferazzi's

The story goes that on the way up to Santa Barbara on Thursday, May 16th, Gary noticed that the ammeter needle on his 1931 Victoria was doing a rain dance (it was raining) between the zero mark and the plus Eventually it settled in at slightly to the negative side of zero. Suspecting that the battery was not being recharged, Gary tried to conserve electricity as much as he could by not turning any lights on (it was day time!) and not using his turn signals (turn signals?). He managed to make it to Santa Barbara on the battery. In Santa Barbara he took the Victoria to John Kennedy's Automotive Repair Agency. The Kennedy Family's team of Model A Ford experts determined that the six volt alternator had quit working (the alternator???). The alternator was removed and sent to a Model A Ford Alternator Regional Repair Center. The next day the alternator was returned in working condition and Gary was back on the road again with the ammeter needle pointing in the right direction. I interviewed Gary shortly after he received the prestigious award and asked him why he thought the alternator had failed. His description of the failure mode lost me in a maze of technical terms. What I was able to understand is that there is some type of wiring problem inherent in the Victoria. Gary said that when he applies the brakes the cowl lights come on and when he actuates the turn signal the dome light blinks on and off. @

Gas Pains!

About the New Gas!

by Roland Barber, Modesto A's At the last Model A meeting, Hank Welch made a report about the new gas we will start putting in our cars. Because some of the club members were not present, I thought I would write about this subject. This new gas will be very hard on cars that are not driven regularly, because the gas will dissolve the gaskets. As of now there is no additive that can be purchased that will counteract this process. Car owners should shut off the gas valve on your "A" and run the car until all gas is out of the carburetor. If your shut off valve does not shut the gas flow off completely; sometimes buying a new valve is not the answer. Some of the new valves leak; I experienced this on our own car, so I purchased a brass valve from a hardware store. I cut the gas line and installed the brass valve. These valves are reasonably priced, and are easy to install. I believe this procedure would also work on other, older cars, that some of the members own. @

We have a great tour planned. It is a four day event and will depart from the Citadel at 10:00 A.M. Thursday, August 1st. Some of the highlights are;

Thursday:

Tour to Lompoc. An afternoon visit to La Purisima Mission; original built in 1787, destroyed by an earthquake, then rebuilt in 1813.

Friday:

Tour of Vandenberg Air Force Base. Some of the sights we expect to see are; the Space Launch Complex including the Space Shuttle launch pad, the Titan Missile Silo, Point Honda (the site of the largest peacetime U.S. Naval disaster in history), the rescue center and weather station. 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


Oil Pump Drive Gear!

Once upon a time I was in the process of building up a Model A engine. I started with a newly machined block and started putting new engine parts in it. It seemed prudent to buy a new oil pump drive gear p\n A6551, and a new collar, p\n A6561A. Then I tried to figure out how they installed in the engine. I reviewed all of my "How to" books and could not find any reference to it. A fellow club member showed me an assembly. The problem I was having is that there is another part you need to complete the assembly and it is not available new as a purchased item. The part is called the oil pump drive bearing p\n A6560, and you have to find an original Henry one. Once you have all three parts you have to assemble them together with a drive pin through the collar and shaft to hold everything in place. You can assemble it hackwards, so you need to know which way is correct. Once you have the assembly complete you drop it down the hole in the bottom center of the valve chamber, gear first, so it will connect with the gear in the middle of the camshaft. A large spring p\n A6570 snaps in over the top and holds it all in place in the engine. Now that I know how it goes together it might be worthwhile to provide a sketch in case someone else has the same problem. The other thing you need to know is that like most reproduction parts you buy for a Model A Ford nowadays, they don't all fit very well. The oil pump drive gear and collar that I bought fit so tight into the original Henry oil pump drive bearing after it was pinned together that it would have taken all of Henry's 40 horses just to turn it. I had to disassemble it and grind some material of the face off the collar flange to provide a little thrust clearance. This is something you definitely want to check. Another thing to look for is the direction of the diagonal oil groove in the shaft of the oil pump drive gear. The sketch shows the correct direction it should be oriented to. There are some reproduction parts around that were made backwards. Bratton's Antique Auto has the correct one. The oil pump drive assembly provides two functions. It drives the oil pump and it drives the distributor. The gear in the center of the camshaft rotates with the camshaft causing the oil pump drive

gear shaft to turn. The screwdriver like blade protruding past the bottom of the oil pump drive gear engages a mating slot in the oil pump when it is installed in the bottom of the block. A similar screwdriver like blade at the top of the oil pump drive gear shaft engages a mating slot in the bottom of the distributor shaft when it is installed through the top of the head. With the timing properly set and the engine running the oil pump drive assembly provides lubrication and ignition to the engine. \odot


