

Special Events:






Santa Barbara Tour 1996

The Riha Riley "Go Fast" Sedan!

The morning of the tour departure to Laughlin via Lake Havasu was a delightfully balmy day. All the cars ran well with the exception of the Riggs rig, which when the tour reached Morongo Valley (by Hwy, 111) did a 180 and the Riggs nursed the 1930 Town Sedan back to it's home. The following morning John & Gwen headed off to Laughlin in their trusty 1928 AR Coupe. But, the real drama was with the Riha Riley "Go Fast" engine in Dick Riha's 1931 Slant Window Sedan. All was going along quite well Friday morning from Lake Havasu on to Laughlin until, without much warning, (quoting Dick) "the @#!!^** son of a **%@!## engine quit". We can always count on Dick to give the proper descriptive adjectives, to express his After much roadside inner most feelings. seminaring, without success, (this is going to be hard to believe) but the Riha Riley would not run, and (here it comes) Dicks Model A Ford had to be towed!! 30 miles into the parking garage at the Ramada Express Hotel in Laughlin! Wow! This was so extraordinary that we were compelled to tell everyone. From all parts of the convention, came a phalanx of great Model A trouble shooting minds. The carburetor, distributor, coil, spark plugs, etc, etc, were changed, not once but several times. The spark and coil wires were tested, the valve cover was removed and the valves checked for bent stems or broken rocker arms (Model A's have rocker arms???) oh well! The valves were also checked for broken springs. None were found. The timing gear cover was removed and the timing gear and the timing were checked. The battery was recharged several times. I think someone even suggested rotating the head lights and getting rid of the stale California air in the tires which then might make the engine run again. But alas, all the King's horses and all the King's men couldn't make the Riha Riley run again. One by one those great minds sauntered off to the casinos, hoping that they would have better luck at the tables than they did in solving the mystery of the very silent Riha Riley. The efforts to locate the problem continued on. Starting fluid was injected into the carburetor, then the spark plugs were removed and the magic starting fluid was injected directly into the combustion chambers, but the Riha Riley refused to run, or even backfire very much. Finally on Saturday afternoon, the choke was propped open and some more starting fluid was injected into the carburetor while the engine was being turned over by the starter motor, when without warning, a great spray of starting fluid was forced out of the carburetor and deposited unceremoniously onto the nearest bystander, who happened to be the person injecting the starting fluid into the carburetor. The problem was solved. A blown head gasket! Within 20 minutes the Riha Riley's head was off and lo and behold the head gasket was found blown between #1 & #2 and Dick who is always well between #3 & #4. supplied with the appropriate spare parts had a Riha Riley head gasket with him. This was most fortunate because this is not an off-the-shelf acquirable item. The Riley uses a special head gasket. After proper cleaning of the head, and the block, the new head gasket was installed and all the parts put back where they belonged (no extra parts left over!). The tension was mounting as Dick got into the driver's seat and with a few turns of the starter the engine roared to life again. The smile on Dick's face was from ear to ear, especially since having to trailer or tow the famous Riha Riley powered "Go Fast" Sedan home was not setting well with Dick. Now Dick of course will say it was just a minor problem, and a simple head gasket replacement cured it. But in reality there were many excellent minds at work trying to locate the illusive problem. With a head gasket blown out at the usual place, between #3 & #4, the engine will start and run, though not very well. Here with all four cylinders affected, the usual symptoms did not add up. A compression gauge would have provided answers a bit quicker, so henceforth I am sure that Dick will have one along in his tool box. Congratulations Dick on being awarded the Hard Luck Trophy. @





Spring Break!

A lot has been said about the precautions that should be taken when working around the rear spring on a Model A Ford. All the "How To" books advise you to use a good spring spreader when ever you remove the rear end from the car. One even suggests that if you remove the rear end with the spring still attached to the axle housings you should wrap a big heavy chain around the spring and the axle housings before you attempt to remove the spring. I personally feel it is prudent to leave the rear spring in the car when pulling the rear end. This way it won't have the opportunity to go through the roof of your garage if the spring spreader slips off. In the March-April MARC publication of the Model A News there was a letter to the editor describing a near fatal accident involving a rear spring. In the case described the rear end had been removed from the car with the spring still attached to the axle housings. A spring spreader was attached and the spring was being spread when the center bolt that holds the leaves together broke.

The letter is quoted below!

I had the rear end out from under a 1929 Model A Pick-Up truck that we were restoring the chassis on. I had the spring spreader in position to spread the spring to remove the shackles. looked good, the bolt was still in place in the center of the leaves. I started cranking on the spreader. As I was leaning over to apply pressure to the handle, the center bolt broke and the top five leaves took off right past my face. I felt the wind. We have a ten foot high ceiling in the building and they hit it! What a sense of relief that they had not hit me; then I realized that they now had to come back down. I was not hit by any of them. Boy, was I lucky! I looked at the bolt protruding from the remaining spring. Most of the head had heen broken from the bolt for a long time. The small portion that held it failed when the spring flexed with the spreader. I will not do any work in the future on springs, whether front or rear, without first putting a stout "C" clamp on it to hold the leaves together. I advise anyone else doing this job to use the same caution. It can't happen to you? It happened to me! Rick Sturim, Wyoming, MI @
