

In what turned out to be a VERY lovely Saturday (May24th), 16 of our club members ventured out to Al Zannino's home in Hemet, Ca., some 75 miles from our Orange County homes.

Al is one of those individuals that grew up knowing basically nothing about Model A's. In his high school days he was mostly interested in "Street" machines, as were so many of us when we were teens. But through time, he came to love the old Model A's. Still having the "racing bug", he got deep into drag racing, hill climbs, and currently land speed record vehicles with Model A's. Belonging to a race club that owns a streamliner, all their members have a chance to build, install, and then drive the club's streamliner.

Al is working on obtaining his 150 MPH drivers license and head out to the famed Bonneville Salt Flats this August to go for a record. 150 MPH with a Model A engine??? Holy smokes!!! And be-

lieve it, or not, there are some Model A's that are capable of almost 200 MPH... That's cookin' !!! Our club members all gathered around to listen to Mr. Zannino talk about all the interesting facets of how he and his other race club chums have built their cars and engines to withstand the incredible punishment of those speeds. And trust me when I say, some of the things that Al and other racers do are mindboggling!!! Think about the fact that stock Model A engines are hard pressed to turn 3,000 RPM's normally and go much over 60 MPH. But the land speed cars/engines are often capable of 5,000-6,000+ RPM's...and they do that without flying apart; or at least that's what they hope for!

Running alcohol and/or nitromethane in a rather fragile Model A engine?? How on earth do they do that?? Install a supercharger and/or a turbocharger?? Amazing!!! A whole lot of engineering, one-off custom built items to strengthen the engines, and a good bit of "Seat-Of-The-Pants" racer's ingenuity that has been gained from many years of trial-and-error experimentation.

After a very interesting and informative visit with AI, everyone loaded up and drove a short distance to Jolene's Country Restaurant and Winchester Farms Country Store for lunch. Then there were the special home made preserves, honey, baked goods, etc., in the old fashion country store. Nothing beats a small taste of "down home" food and home-made goods!

Thank you Mr. Zannino for sharing with us the interesting aspects of serious Model A racing. Good luck to you on your quest to go as fast as you can out at the Bonneville Salt Flats.

Bucks and Ballyhoo...by Diane Gaughen Continuing series on the evolution and development of Route 66

Route 66 wasn't just a great way to get across the country, but it was a way to make money and be a part of adventures. June Morris was a kid who grew up watching Route 66 being constructed near her grandfather's farm in Miller, Missouri. She got to see matinee idol Douglas Fairbanks drive his sweetie, Mary Pickford on the highway. She also witnessed a giant flatbed truck carrying the huge mirror to the Mount Palomar Observatory in California. This was more fun than going to the movies!

One of the greatest events for sheer outrageousness was the time in 1928 when sports promoter C. C. Pyle staged a 3400-mile footrace (The Bunion Derby) from Los Angeles to Chicago following Route 66. It continued on from there all the way to New York City and ended 3 months later. The prize for the winner was \$25,000! Teletype and radio allowed people to follow the fates of the runners until they finally made it to their destination. It was great

publicity for the not-yet-fully-paved road.

The winner was Andy Payne, a Cherokee Indian who had grown up on a farm in Oklahoma. He hoped the prize money would help his family who was struggling and pay for his wedding! Oklahoma welcomed the runners and Will Rogers even offered a prize to the first runner to reach his hometown of Claremore.

I must admit, I do not pay it as much attention as it deserves. As such, there are "issues"! How we escape the coveted Hard Luck trophy is indeed a mystery.

For episode 1, let's start with the ongoing starting problem. Many of you have watched over as I attempted to start our Station Wagon. Err.. Err... Errrrr....pop. Er.. Errer. Ererrerere ka-chuga-chuga...running. It was just as painful for me and my family sitting in the car, as it was for you standing by listening to it struggle to turn over. I was to the point of parking in a, 'pop the clutch' position, as often as possible. Well, this problem reared its ugly head in the absolute, most convenient of spaces: in my garage! Lucky me!

As I was giving the Woody a once over prior to the Ridge Route tour, I had a new ground cable that I wanted to attach. The cable was a second ground that would go from the battery to the transmission housing. This would be in addition to the frame ground hoping it may solve the starting challenges. I happily installed the 'second cable' only to go from a car that actually started to one that didn't even go click. Huh?

After checking continuity and power all the way through the system...even swapping parts from my Cabriolet to the Woody— NOTHING! The battery showed 6.5 volts at rest, so that certainly couldn't be the problem. I swapped starters, starter switches, and even considered swapping cables from the Cabriolet. After more testing, I decided to have the battery load tested—it failed! New battery in place, she cranks right up. How long has this battery been bad? I think it was bad when I bought it 4 years ago! Happy motoring.
